

Arthritis Among Adults in Colorado

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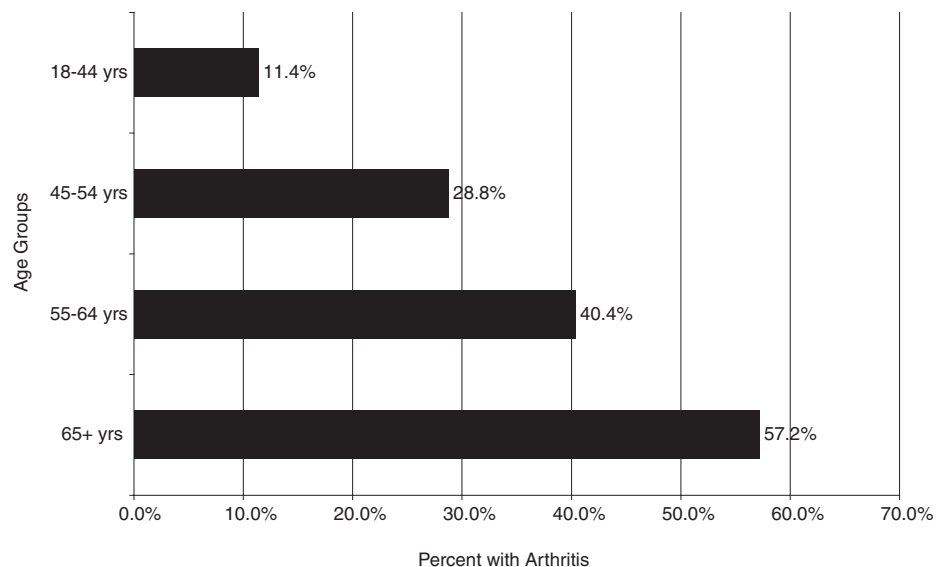
Introduction

Almost one-fourth (24.6%) of adults in Colorado have been diagnosed by a doctor or other health professional with some form of arthritis.¹ Arthritis causes pain, stiffness, and sometimes swelling in or around joints and is the leading cause of disability in the United States. The information in this report is from the Colorado Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), which is a joint project of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System is the world's largest ongoing telephone health survey of adults ages 18 and older.

Among the Findings

Over 835,000 Colorado adults (1 in 4 persons) suffer from arthritis diagnosed by a health professional. Fifty-seven percent (57%) of those ages 65 years and older suffer from arthritis. An additional 734,000 adults report possible arthritis (chronic joint pain but no diagnosis of arthritis provided by a doctor).

Among adults with arthritis in Colorado:

- 34 percent are limited in their usual activities because of arthritis; and
- 28 percent report that arthritis affects their work.

Adults with arthritis, compared to those without arthritis, are more likely to:

- be physically inactive (13% vs. 8%); and
- report their health as fair or poor (21% vs. 9%).

As the population ages, it is estimated that increasing numbers of people will be affected by arthritis.²
